





Young Nungas Yarning Together

The Young Nungas Yarning Together Program targets Indigenous youth aged between 12-18 years of age.

It identifies that many youth of secondary school age may be experiencing significant changes in their lives and that this time is a time where they may become exposed to risk taking activities through their peers.

This project will focus on building on the strengths of Indigenous youth, listening to the voice of Aboriginal youth and developing links with the community to identify and develop strategies for the prevention and harm minimization of drug use.


These Programs will be designed to encourage Indigenous participation by providing fun activities that are relevant to the needs of young Indigenous people.
